Does the relentless digitalization of contemporary life challenge extant theories of society? My talk indirectly addresses this issue by considering the fate, under digitalization, of certain ideas and phenomena discussed in my 2010 book, The Timespace of Human Activity. Among the matters it considers are the doubling of activity and teleology that can accompany actions carried out through digital media such as games; how digitalization can wither practices and destroy their ceremonial character; how the incorporation of digital devices can disrupt timespace and the social infrastructure of interwoven timespaces; and what notions of space are needed to conceptualize the digitalized practice nexuses that increasingly compose social life.

## Our Keynote Speakers



Paul Leonardi, the Duca Family Professor of Technology Management at UC Santa Barbara and the director of the Ph.D. program in Organization Studies within the Department of Technology Management. He is interested in how implementing new technologies and harnessing the power of informal social networks can help companies take advantage of their knowledge assets to create innovative products and services. Paul Leonardi has authored four books and more than 60 articles that have appeared in top journals across the fields of Management, Communication, and Information Systems. He also regularly publishes his work in Harvard Business Review and MIT Sloan Management Review.



Valérie Chanal, Professor of Strategic Management, Innovation, and Creativity at Université Grenoble Alpes. She is head of the Innovative Pedagogy and Interdisciplinarity programme at Grenoble Graduate School of Management and Scientific coordinator of the Promising Project, a project dedicated to developing training programs for innovation and creativity. Her research interests include strategic management, innovation, creativity, and knowledge management among teams and organizations.



Ted Schatzki, Professor of Geography, and of Philosophy and Sociology. He is former Senior Associate Dean in the College of Arts & Sciences, former Chair of the Department of Philosophy, and cofounder and former codirector of the University's Committee on Social Theory. His current research interests are a practice-theory-of-institutions account of blockchain and, more generally, algorithmic organization; the digital mediation of social relations and associations; and the conceptions of space needed to understand digitalized society. Schatzki is the author of five books and numérous articles on social topics such as flat ontology, large social phenomena, institutional theory, social change, materiality, and governance, as well as many essays on human action and the philosophies of Wittgenstein and Heidegger.

Currently, she is engaged in the field of critical management studies (CMS), mainly in the examination of power relations in organizations and the ways they are challenged. She is currently the President's Advisor for Gender Equity and the Chair of the Organizations and Labor Community at the Israel Sociological Association.



Jenny Helin, Associate Professor in Organisation in the Department of Business Studies, Uppsala University, Sweden. She is currently involved in two research projects: one about generosity in local development and another about non-digital organising. Besides, Jenny holds a great interest in collaborative research methods and explores academic writing that goes beyond the traditional, masculine academic language, logic and culture. Moreover, she is the director of GRASS, Uppsala University Graduate Studies in Sustainability Studies.


